2018 Early Education & Care Fact Sheet

Affordability

Nevada ranks as the least affordable in the nation for the cost of infant care in licensed family child care and the 8th least affordable in licensed centers. The cost of infant care represents 55% of income for a family of three living at 100% of poverty, and 40% of income for a family of three living at 140% of poverty. Currently in Nevada, families earning more than 140% of poverty would not qualify for child care subsidy.



Center-based infant care in Nevada exceeds the cost of tuition and fees at UNR/UNLV[†] by 30%.

\$7,764 per year (taking 15 credits both fall and spring semesters).

In 2017, Nevada served 5.84% of children living below 200% of poverty on the Subsidy program. From September 2015 to March 2018, Nevada increased the monthly subsidy caseload by 4188 children (an increase of 77.86%).

A single mom with two children earning the median family income would spend 56% of her income to access center-based care for her infant and preschooler in Nevada. In Clark County, she would have to spend 59% of her income and in Washoe County, 54% of her income.


According to Child Care Aware of America, the cost of center-based child care exceeds the annual cost of transportation in every state. It also exceeds the average cost that families spend on food.



From 2008 to 2017, Nevada experienced a 52% decline in licensed family child care programs and a 5% decline in licensed centers. During the same period, Nevada's overall licensed capacity has declined by 4891 slots (-10.5%); however, over the last two years a small net gain of 924 slots (2.2%) has occured in centers and group family care.

Workforce The median wage of an early childhood teacher working in a licensed setting in Nevada is \$11.50 an hour—equivalent to a full-time wage of \$23,920 a year. This is \$11,003 less than Nevada's median income for workers (\$34,923).
